## NEW GERMANY

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During the COVID 19 below is the city policy. CITY OF NEW GERMANY EMERGENCY DECLA-RATION ACTIONS AND POLICIES

Based upon the guidance of the CDC, Minnesota Department of Health and Federal and State authorities, Mayor Steve Van Lith, with the support of the New Germany City Council, has declared a State of Emergency for the City of New Germany, Minnesota on March 17, 2020. The following actions and policies are herein enacted on April 7, 2020 and shall continue until such time as this declaration is rescinded or otherwise terminated.

- 1. The City suspends all water shut offs until termination of the Declaration of Emergency. Many people are without work, and enforcement of water shut offs would compound difficulties people in our community 🖈 are currently facing. Additionally, water shut offs place Public Works staff in direct contact with people in the community which is in opposition to the direction provided by the CDC and Minnesota Department of Health.
- 2. The City suspends all non-essential workshops & services of Liaisons to external groups and all other non-essential meetings are suspended until termination of the Declaration of Emergency. This will help protect members serving in these groups from any unnecessary contact with other people and reduce the risk of exposure to the virus, Planning Commission shall meet as needed at the 6 ft social distance and or remotely.
- 4. City Hall closed to limit exposure to the public. City Hall will remain closed to the public (March 18 in effect) until further notice or action by the City Council. City Hall is staffed, and members of the community can contact staff by calling (952) 353-2488 or by email: ngcityhall@gmail.com
- 5. Council Meetings. The City will not, at this time, conduct Council Meetings telephonically or remotely. This policy could change as this fluid situation develops. Council Meetings will be limited to 10 or fewer people in attendance in Council Chambers at any given time, and the social separation guidance of maintaining 6 feet between people will be followed. 6. City Hall Staffing. At this time, no changes are recommended for the scheduling of City Hall Staff. In the event if needed the Clerk shall have the option of flexi-

ble work arrangements. Flexible work arrangements will include working remotely, employee that does work remotely should continue to work their normal business hours unless they have made other arrangements.

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Every year in May your sewer portion of your utility bill is refigured and is based on your water usage from the Jan/Feb/March. This is a fixed fee for the next 12 months. There was also an increase in sewer for 2020, the base rate is \$41.70 includes the first 1000 gallons and \$17.86 per additional 1000 gallons. This will all reflect in your May bill.

#### Creating a pollinator patch **Pollinator Patches**

We hear a lot about pollinators in the news and how populations of bees, butterflies and other insects are in decline. The decline is mostly due to habitat loss and pesticide use. Pollinators need two things to survive: somewhere to nest and flowers to gather nectar and pollen from for food

Seventy-five percent of all flowering plants depend on animal pollinators for reproduction. Additionally, 1/3 of our food production relies on pollinators. Pollinators provide valuable environmental services to our earth and billions of dollars of services to our food production. It is important we protect them by creating habitat and not using

# pesticides. Only 5%

The good news you can help in your own yard. Changing only 5% of your lawn to pollinator friendly plants makes a huge difference. These pollinator "patches," create habitat throughout urban and suburban areas and provide vital food and nesting areas. Many pollinators such as the endangered rusty patch bumblebee are seeking refuge in suburban and urban areas. The Twin Cities metro area is one of few places where the rusty patch bumblebee can still be found with some regularity. Creating a pollinator patch in your yard could help prevent an extinction. What to plant

Planting a pollinator patch may require removing grass and will require preparing the area for planting. The biggest question is often "what to plant?" Here are three resources that tell you exactly what plants help pollinators. Find ones that match your sun, shade and soil conditions. Make sure to plant some grasses too. Pollinators use those for shelter and nesting sites.
