It's a hot summer. Time to talk water and watering. By Madeline Seveland What to do during dry times

In Minnesota, we typically get almost all the water we need for grass and gardens from rain. But dry summer times and hot temperatures can cause browning. In the twin cities metro area, we are behind on precipitation. Add the hot temperatures and traditional lawns may start to turn brown. Browning is the grass going into dormancy. The roots and the base of the grass are still alive, but some leaf tissues may die. However, once water and cooler temps return, so does new grass growth with no long-term damage. During these hot, dry times, consider allowing some browning of lawns to conserve water. **Get the most out of watering**—If your grass or gardens do need water, follow these steps to make sure you are watering efficiently. Maintain your system. Broken or sunken heads, leaking seals, clogged nozzles, titled heads, spray patterns off (watering beyond the grass lines onto the street and sidewalks) and plant spray-deflection should be fixed. Set the timer for when you have breakfast so you can see if there are any issues with the system. Water in early morning to prevent water loss and mold build up. Operate your controller in manual mode – if you believe your system is watering too much or too often. Having a rain sensor with your system is a law, established in 2003. Make sure your rain sensor is outside and can "sense" rain.

Get smart -One way to make sure irrigation systems are watering grass and gardens with just the right amount is to use a smart controller. While traditional controllers operate on preset programmed schedule or timers, smart irrigation controllers monitor weather, soil conditions, evaporation and plant water use to automatically adjust the watering schedule to actual conditions of the site. Therefore, only providing the lawn what it needs, and not watering when it is raining or has recently rained. Additionally, these controllers often pay for themselves in a short time with the water they save. Many cities in Carver County offer discounts on controllers, check <u>www.go.rachio.com/</u><u>carvercounty/</u>.

What to remember during wet times - Grass needs about 1" of water a week and that can come from rain or a hose. Often, we are overwatering our lawns. Using too much water for irrigation affects our groundwater supplies, the health of our lakes and rivers, and sometimes your own basement. Overwatering reduces the soil's "room" for water, called headspace. This is the ability of soil to absorb water during heavy rains. Reduced soil headspace can create more work for sump pumps and cause basement flooding. When the soil can't absorb enough water, rain events and even just watering your lawn and create extra stormwater runoff. Runoff is rainwater or snowmelt that runs off hard surfaces like streets, roofs and driveways. Runoff washes pollutants found on surfaces such as pet waste, grass clippings and trash, into lakes, rivers, and ponds causing water pollution.

Finally, most irrigation water comes from our groundwater aquifers, the same place we get our drinking water. More water used for irrigation means less available for us to drink, cook with and clean with. These aquifers are recharging much slower than we are taking water out, so conservation is important.

Conserving water is a win for all - Water is a precious resource. Finding the balance between when lawn and gardens need to be watered and when a little browning is okay is important to conserving our drinking water for the future. Overwatering produces runoff into our storm water basins, streams and lakes and uses treated drinking water, adding high costs to our communities. Properly maintaining your irrigation system will save you water, money, and will reduce the impact overwatering has on the environment. If we put less water on our ground, we can help conserve our drinking water supplies, reduce basement flooding, protect our lakes and rivers and still enjoy green, healthy grass.

Sheriff number to call in complaints - all calls use 911

If you need to notify somebody of a barking dog (day or night), or late night noises, speeding vehicles or fireworks, etc., or anything that is not an emergency, you still use the 911 number. You do not need to leave a note or phone message at the city office *unless you want to file a formal complaint*. The Sheriff can respond to an incident while it is happening instead of hearing about it later, when they can no longer do anything about it. You can request your name be withheld. There are some issues that need to be dealt with while they are happening for better results. Reminder—outside recreational fires need to be in a fire pit and or contained 3 x 3 size.
